Using can, may, shall, will, could, should, would and might to show probability

Modal verbs such as *can*, *may* and *shall* are a special set of verbs used to show possibility, probability or certainty. To achieve this, they are paired with another verb to show how likely it is that the second verb will happen (e.g. I *will* leave, I *might* leave, I *should* leave). They are also used to show permission, e.g. You *can* go out. They can be used in different tenses, with the addition of *be* or *have* (e.g. I *might* be going or I *could* have gone).
