How will it fly? Will it fly like a kite? A hot air balloon? An aeroplane? How will it steer?</i> Draw and label your flying machine. Use everything that you have learnt over the last two weeks about flying</p>	<p>Using your design from yesterday, today you are going to write a short story based on your design.</p> <p>Think of your short story in three main parts.</p> <p>Beginning – Character makes flying machine. He/she tests it but it doesn't quite work. Maybe it crashes!</p> <p>Middle – Character finds some inspiration and makes alterations to the flying machine.</p> <p>End – Flying machine works or doesn't work!</p> <p>Write some ideas/notes for each part.</p> <p>Now write your short story. Remember to include some Year 3 sentence types/skills</p>

	<p>Design your own kite and write a short description of it underneath.</p>	<p>spelling and grammatical inaccuracies).</p> <p>Think about how you make a kite. If you haven't made a kite before you can use the clip below. <i>How To Make A Simple Kite for Kids:</i> https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=dismSOx3q0g</p> <p>You could base your instructions on the Flat Stanley kite that you made in an earlier unit.</p> <p>Features that you might want to include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – <i>What You Need/ Apparatus</i> section at the start – <i>bullet points/ numbers</i> to sequence the steps – <i>imperative</i> (bossy) <i>verbs</i>, e.g. <i>place, stick</i> – some <i>adverbs</i>, e.g. <i>carefully, gently, firmly</i> – a <i>diagram/illustration</i> to help. 	<p>some real hot air balloons on the clips below:</p> <p><i>Hot Air Balloon Mass Ascent – Balloon Festival Barnstorf 2019</i> https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CjOC1CSPBW0 (Up to 3:30 mins)</p> <p><i>Colourful Time-Lapse of Hot Air Balloons in New Mexico – Short Film Showcase</i> (spelt <i>colorful</i> in this American video). https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QGAMTII6XxY</p>	<p>to help you with your design.</p>	<p>that you have learnt, e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – <i>use different conjunctions in your writing</i> (e.g. <i>when, although, since, before, after, until</i>) – <i>use adverbs in your writing</i> (e.g. <i>carefully, happily, soon, silently, next</i>) – <i>use inverted commas (speech marks) to show a character is speaking</i> – <i>use prepositions</i> (e.g. <i>above, below, beneath, beyond, within, outside</i>) <p>Decide if you are writing in first person (I) or third person (he/she). Make sure you keep it the same throughout the story.</p> <p>Keep re-reading your story as you write to check it makes sense and you are happy with it. Check for spelling and punctuation too!</p>
